Re: Nomination for the John E. Stecklein Distinguished Member Award

The purpose of this letter is to nominate Dr. Dawn Geronimo Terkla for the Association for Institutional Research's *John E. Stecklein Distinguished Member Award*.

The criteria for this recognition are that the recipient:

- 1. Has been an active member of AIR and has made substantial contributions to the field of institutional research over an extended period of time.
- 2. Through research, service, and/or practice has made a significant contribution to the field of institutional research in two or more of the following areas:
- a. Advanced the practice of institutional research through innovative ideas, techniques, or theory;
- b. Contributed to widely-disseminated research;
- c. Supported the training and development of IR practitioners;
- d. Promoted the application of IR theories and practices in new venues and/or organizations;
- e. Demonstrated the contributions of institutional research to policy formation; and/or.
- f. Contributed to the field of institutional research in another significant way.

In this nomination letter and the attached support letters, Dr. Terkla's qualifications and exemplary and distinguished leadership, which she has given to the profession of Institutional Research, are presented. In addition, her distinguished career and contributions are outlined in her attached Vita.

Dr. Terkla is a past president (2001-2002) of AIR and served a two-year term as Forum Chair (1997-8). (She currently is not serving in any elected position.) She has been an active member of AIR since the early 1980's and was recognized for her *Outstanding Service* in 2006. In her elected positions and many volunteer activities, Dr. Terkla's extensive leadership and contributions to the Association have been continuous and significant. In addition, Dr. Terkla has served as President of the North East Association for Institutional Research (NEAIR) and was recognized for her *Distinguished Service* by NEAIR. Her election to leadership positions, both in the NEAIR and AIR, reflects the confidence her colleagues have in her professional knowledge and leadership abilities – qualities that are described and praised in the letters supporting this nomination.

Dawn's professional responsibilities, since completing her doctorate from Harvard University in 1983 have expanded, in criticality to the University's administration and leadership. In 1985 she started at Tufts University as the Director of Analytical Studies and has steadily taken on increasingly more complex administrative positions, currently holding the position of Associate Provost. Core in all of these positions, she has had responsibility to the University's leadership for institutional planning and decision support. In addition, she has held an adjunct professor position with Tuft's Cummings School of Veterinary Medicine, Infectious Disease and Global Health since 2012. This is an active appointment that has seen Dawn working on projects in central Africa.

Dr. Terkla's record of publications and paper presentations reflect the work of a consumate professional, publishing the results of data based research and discussions directed at the profession and conduct of institutional research as well as higher education leadership and administration. She has also published with her academic colleagues. Her publications have appeared in a wide range of academic journals including: The Journal of Student Financial Aid, New Directions for Institutional Research, Currents, Research in Higher Education, Trusteeship, Education Statistics Quarterly, and Journal of Veterinary Medical Education, as well as the AIR Professional File. In addition to her publications, Dawn has a continuous record of paper presentations that includes presentations at AIR, NEAIR and international institutional research related invited presentations (including Ireland, European AIR, and Japan).

In addition to Dawn's leadership service to NEAIR and AIR, her impact on the profession of institutional research has been felt through her work with NCES, the U.S. Department of Education - National Postsecondary Education Cooperative (NPEC), Council on Postsecondary Education Statistics, National Association of Independent Colleges and Universities, National Association of College and University Business Officers, and the National Student Clearinghouse Advisory Committee. These organizations have important relationships with our universities, through mandated Federal reporting, student data collections, and, for private institutions, an interface with Federal legislative agencies. Her presence with these organizations has been an important voice for institutional research across higher education as related to the data collection mandates of the Federal government as well as the relevance of unique student data collection and student tracking at the national level. Over the years her interaction with these agencies has increased significantly their understanding of not only the data they want to collect, but also of the realities of how our universities and colleges function to serve their students and communities.

In the attached letters supporting this nomination, Dr. Terkla's distinguished contributions as a professional in institutional research and planning, as well as her leadership and mentorship, reflect a leader who has consistently supported the technical and professional growth and success of those working with her at Tufts University and colleagues across the country. I have known Dawn for 25+ years and worked with her on several projects. I have found her to be a hardworking and honest professional, consistently meeting commitments on time with the highest of standards;

always with a sincere willingness to listen to others' ideas and suggestions. Her work is truly a model for innovative productivity in cooperative projects and programs.

A note about the number of letters supporting this nomination. In response to the call for nominations, two independent efforts were initiated to nominate Dawn for the Distinguished Member Award. When I became aware that Michelle Appel and Ellen Peters, were also putting a nomination together for Dawn, we agreed to merge our efforts and submit one nomination letter and include all the support letters that were written in response to requests from Michelle, Ellen, and myself. In the attached letters our colleagues and others that have worked with Dawn praise an institutional research professional that has lived a distinguished career as an institutional research professional, mentor, leader, and academic.

Dear Members of the Award Selection Committee:

I am delighted to support the nomination of Dawn Terkla for the John Stecklein Distinguished Member Award. Having now had the opportunity to work with outstanding institutional research professionals at three different institutions—MIT, Tufts, and Harvard—I can say without hesitation that she has no peer.

When I became president of Tufts in 2001, I was eager to inform my decision-making with data. I quickly discovered in Dawn a partner of extraordinary insight and skill, and she went on to lead countless projects on my behalf. Chief among her successes during my ten years as president was the creation of a dashboard to communicate to members of the Board of Trustees our progress on significant initiatives. Alongside the usual performance metrics for admissions, fundraising, and endowment performance, we tracked the progress of strategies intended to upgrade the quality of the faculty, make Tufts more research intensive, increase the intellectual engagement of students, and improve the experience of alumni. For example, we started tracking our number of "touches" with alumni—attendance at events and reunions, as well as their time spent interviewing prospective students, among other activities—as an alternative to simply measuring the proportion of alumni who gave to the annual fund. As we invested in more support for alumni, the number of "touches" increased, as did alumni contributions.

More elusive than metrics for alumni engagement were metrics for faculty quality. In this area, Dawn's creativity and ingenuity shined. She suggested tracking the proportion of new faculty recruited from the top ten graduate programs ranked by the National Research Council (NRC), as well as research volume per faculty member disaggregated by discipline, patent filings, and intellectual property revenue. We also started to track and report membership in the various national academies. These efforts not only helped orient our board members, but also generated opportunities to educate them about the nuance of specific topics. One year, for example, our numbers dropped significantly on the proportion of faculty recruited from NRC-ranked graduate programs. It turned out that year we recruited four faculty from Cambridge and Oxford, two outstanding institutions not included in the NRC rankings by virtue of their location.

The dashboard Dawn built fundamentally changed the conversation in the boardroom at Tufts. Trustees began to focus on strategy in ways that they never did previously, and their conversations were elevated greatly. When I began teaching in the Program for New College Presidents at the Harvard Graduate School of Education, I used the tool to illustrate how to engage one's board on issues of strategy. A significant number of participants replicated the dashboard at

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their own institutions, extending Dawn's influence and impact to colleges and universities across the country.

Dawn also advanced my leadership in areas of critical importance to society at large. Early in my tenure at Tufts, we decided to make civic engagement a central focus of the University, and we created a new College of Citizenship and Public Service. Dawn led an important effort to measure our success in educating students to be active and engaged citizens. Her work was crucial both in gaining philanthropic support and in persuading faculty and board members that we were making progress. More than \$50 million in endowment was raised to support the initiative, and our approach—expertly documented by Dawn in a series of publications—had a profound influence at other universities.

If anything matches Dawn's professional excellence, it is her university citizenship. For each of my ten years at Tufts, we co-advised freshman. I have never worked with a more attentive, more informed, or more caring first-year adviser. She cared for our advisees when they were sick, found them research opportunities on campus, and helped them line up summer jobs. Moreover, she took it upon herself to set up a program to evaluate the effectiveness of individual first-year advisers. Once we had data, we started assigning the best of them to first-generation students in need of more intensive advising. This simple measure improved the academic performance of one of our more vulnerable student populations almost immediately.

Dawn Terkla is technically superb and deeply human. She is generous with her colleagues and enthusiastic about helping others get started in her profession. She is much in demand as an educator and lecturer, and she has served on countless accreditation teams and review panels. Her work at Tufts during my presidency became so important to my leadership that I moved institutional research into the Provost's Office so that it could inform all academic planning. She is today an associate provost with a greatly—and rightfully—expanded portfolio. I doubt there is a better qualified candidate for the John Stecklein Distinguished Member Award, and it is an honor to submit this letter of support.

To the AIR Awards Selection Committee,

I am writing this letter in support of Dawn Terkla for the AIR John Stecklein Distinguished Member Award. Another thing that I want to highlight about Dawn is her remarkable ability to balance her commitment to her institution with her service to the broader field of institutional research and higher education as a whole. Normally, being responsible for the institutional research function of an



entire multi-campus research university, establishing an unwavering level of trust with campus partners, and habitually never saying "no" to an unending stream of requests would be more than enough for someone in Dawn's position. Even with all of that on her plate, it did not stop Dawn from leading professional institutional research associations, contributing to the field with publications, and providing guidance to the federal government as well as a slew of organizations focused on higher education policy.

Finally, I would be remiss if I did not mention the personal impact that Dawn has had on so many institutional research colleagues over the years. She is a truly generous person. I am only one of the many people who have benefited from her thoughtfulness and wise counsel.
